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- 1) What branch and unit were you in? Navy (Hospital Corpsman) with Fleet Marine Force (FMF).
- 2) What was your highest rank? *Petty Officer 1st Class assigned to a Marine Corps unit.*
- 3) Are you still enlisted as a reservist or National Guard? *No, retired after 21 years.*
- 4) Why did you join the service? Wanted to serve my country. Members of the family have been in the service since the Spanish-American War.
- 5) What did you like the most about being in? Serving with the Marine Corps, the camaraderie, it's really hard to explain. That's why I stayed with what we call 'the green side of the house' for so long. If a Marine needed your assistance, you never let him down, you were always there for him.

- What moment most defined your military experience? Serving with Marines. I would do anything for a Marine in a heartbeat. They put a higher standard on us, but once they were sure of you, they would do the same.
